NADHA HASSEN

Nadha Hassen has been actively involved in community-based HIV/AIDS research, education and programming for children, youth and women. She is currently a Master of Public Health (MPH) student at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto. She is specializing in Health Promotion, with complementary pursuits through the Global Health Focus and as a CIHR Fellow in Public Health Policy. She has worked on promoting cross-cultural dialogue among youth between Canada and Tanzania with Africa's Children-Africa's Future (AC-AF), as well as mythbusting and reducing stigma around HIV/AIDS.

SCOTT DOWNING

Scott Downing began his piano studies at the age of 7 and at 18 began seriously considering piano for his post secondary education. He is now in his third year of the Piano Performance Programme at the University of Toronto Music Department. He participated in the 2013 Canadian Music Competition national finals held in Sherbrooke Quebec. During the summer he also participated in the Tsar's Village Music Festival in St. Petersburg, Russia. He plans to continue his graduate studies in piano performance. PRABHAT JHA

Prabhat Jha is the founding director of CGHR. He is also the Inaugural University of Toronto Endowed investigator of the Disease Control Priorities Network, and expert advisor to the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation on HIV/AIDS control in India and to various governments around the world on disease control strategies. Prior to founding CGHR, Prabhat headed the World Bank team responsible for developing the Second National HIV/AIDS Control Program in India. He also served as a senior scientist for the World Health Organization, where he led the work on health and poverty for the Commission on Macroeconomics and Health. Prabhat has published widely on tobacco, HIV/AIDS, premature mortality, and the health of the global poor. Two of his ground-breaking publications on tobacco control policy led to the first-ever global treaty on tobacco control, now signed by over 160 countries. Among other projects at CGHR, Prabhat is currently leading one of the world's largest prospective studies of premature mortality called the Million Death Study.

Select opera/musical theatre roles and excerpts include: Zerlina (Don Giovanni); Margaret Johnson (The Light in the Piazza); Marilla Cuthbert (Anne of Green Gables); Maria (West Side Story); Susanna (Le nozze di Figaro); Despina (Cosi fan tutte); Semele (Semele); First Lady, Papagena (The Magic Flute). At the University of Toronto Opera School, she performed in the World Premiere of the Student Composer Collective mainstage opera, Antigone, in the role of ‘Ismene’ and just this past March 2013, she appeared as ‘The Governess’ in U of T’s production of The Turn of the Screw by Benjamin Britten, directed by Michael Cavanagh and conducted by Stephen Hargreaves.

Adanya’s community involvement extends beyond the stage. She has been on numerous councils and committees with the University of Toronto Faculty of Music and Victoria College and is the Producer for the newest interdisciplinary New Music and opera company in Toronto.

Accompanist Tom King is a Toronto-based pianist who completed undergraduate studies at the University of Alberta, the University of Ottawa, and the Grieg Academy in Bergen, Norway. Tom holds a Masters of Music degree in Collaborative Piano from the University of Western Ontario where he studied with pianist John Hess. As well being in demand as a collaborative pianist and teacher, he has worked as an orchestral pianist for the Edmonton Symphony, has performed with acts such as the Pointer Sisters and Petula Clark, is an accomplished jazz pianist having performed throughout Canada including performances at the Vancouver, Victoria, Calgary, Edmonton and Montreal International Jazz Festivals, and is a founding member of Toronto's PayadoraTango Ensemble.

FREDERICK KWASI DUNYO

Frederick Kwasi Dunyo was born in the Ewe village of Dagbame, Volta Region of Ghana, West Africa. He has been drumming from the time he was a small boy, standing on blocks to reach the top of the drums. Since that time he has drummed, danced, taught and directed extensively in a variety of contexts both in Ghana and North America. Kwasi was lead drummer with Sankofa Dance Theatre for 1977 to 1981m under the tutelage of Godwin Agbeli. He has performed with numerous drum and dance societies in Ghana. Kwasi is founder and artistic director of Kekeli Drum and Dance Ensemble, Toronto as well as West African Cultural Exchange Centre in Dagbame, Ghana (affiliated with the Centre for National Culture). His open and generous style and great love of music has earned him many praises. He is an instructor in the Faculty of Music, University of Toronto. He has performed and given workshops at many Canadian universities including the University of Saskatchewan, Guelph University, University of Waterloo, University of Western Ontario, McMaster University, and Brock University.
